May 23–June 10

Greek Readings: Synoptic Gospels

BIB602 • 3 credit hours
10:15–11:30 a.m.; 3:00–4:30 p.m.

This basic course in the New Testament exegesis sequence offers (1) reading skill in Koine Greek, (2) an introduction to the major literary and theological issues in interpreting the Synoptic Gospels, (3) practice with a “hands-on” method of studying biblical texts, and (4) familiarity with computer programs that facilitate reading and exegeting the Greek text. The student in this course also will begin a Bible study journal for use in other seminary courses and future ministry. Prerequisite: Beginning Greek.

June 13–24

Torah and Ethics

BIB652 • 2 credit hours
8:30–11:30 a.m.

This is an upper level Bible class. The student should have some familiarity with the contents of the Bible as well as the modern study of it. The purpose of the course is threefold: (1) to learn what is in the Torah: its content, composition, and structure; (2) to understand the legal material in its historical context, examining how it functioned in the early church and how it functions in the canon as a whole; and (3) to briefly consider modern ethical theory and to reflect on the role of the canon and of the laws within the canon in Christian practice.

Because this class studies the Torah, it is filled with pleasure and joy. It also will open up new vistas in understanding biblical law and how it was applied in the early church as witnessed to by the New Testament.

The resources of the faith community as a context for growth and wholeness are especially highlighted.

Contemporary Issues in Youth Ministry: Doing Theology with Youth

CHM548A • 1 credit hour

Friday, 1:45–4:30 p.m.,

6:30–9:30 p.m.,

Saturday, 8:30–11:30 a.m.,

1:45–4:30 p.m.

What do service projects, winter retreats, summer conventions, lock-ins, and bowl-a-thons tell our youth about God? What “youthful questions” are raised when viewing Bible passages and life events through the lens of young people? How do movies, TV shows, Top 40 hits, and pop art inform youth about God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit? This course will help adults connect congregational life and youth group activities to the spiritual development of youth through theological reflection on humor, relationships, recreation, pop culture, music, prayer, worship, and Bible study. We will explore what it means to listen to youth and their insights and consider how creativity, awe, mystery, passion, Psalms of Lament, and role-modeling can help youth discover the sacred in ordinary life.

July 18–29

Pastoral Care of Youth and Young Adults

CHM545 • 2 credit hours
8:30–11:30 a.m.

This course focuses on helping youth and young adults navigate the complexities and joys of adolescence to early adulthood within the context of a compassionate church community. Identity formation, vocation, gender differences, family transitions, social relationships, cultural and academic pressures, and recent discoveries about the teenage brain will be addressed. Students will gain understanding in proactive skills for responding to crisis situations involving addictions, violence, suicide, depression, sexual abuse, eating disorders, effects of trauma from childhood, and other issues. Students will gain knowledge in counseling techniques, seeking outside resources, working with “at-risk” youth and supporting families, and will identify the theological implications of hope, suffering, personal and corporate healing, and reconciliation.

Worship course

August 1–12

Celebrating the Christian Year

CHM514 • 2 credit hours
8:30–11:30 a.m.

With the story of Jesus at the center of the Christian year, this course explores ways congregational worship can more fully celebrate the good news of our faith. Attention is given to the history of the Christian calendar and current worship practices. The seasons of Advent-Christmas-Epiphany, Lent and Holy Week, and Easter-to-Pentecost are a focus. Ordinary Time and special days, such as Annunciation, Ascension, and All Saints Day, will be considered. Along with Scripture, prayer, and preaching, the role of the arts will be emphasized. The course requires participation in a day-long workshop on Saturday, Aug. 6. Because of this, class will be dismissed on Monday, Aug. 8.

Leadership Sea Changes in the Emerging Church

CHM527 • 2 credit hours

Monday through Friday, 8:30–11:30 a.m., 6:30–9:30 p.m.;
Saturday, 8:30–11:30 a.m.; 1:45–4:30 p.m.

The church is changing and must change. This seminar-style course shows how and why. Its special focus is on the implications of these changes for church leadership. Employing biblical models of leadership as foundational, the course will raise tough questions about prevailing preconceptions and patterns. It will describe the essentials of biblical leadership in mission-focused churches and leadership scenarios in post-institutional, postmodern North American culture. It will learn from the Emergent Church Movement and explore the following topics:

- shifting denominational and regional leadership roles;

- the recovery of apostolic leadership;
- change-agent skills;
- transdenominational networking and partnering;
- intercultural preaching and communication;
- the growing upheaval in church leadership training.

August 5–12

Post-Christendom: Church and Mission in a Strange New World

CHM652 • 2 credit hours

Friday, 6:30–9:30; Saturday, 8:30–11:30 a.m., 1:45–4:30 p.m.;
Monday–Friday, 8:30–11:30 a.m.

Much of western culture is experiencing a culture shift—from Christendom to post-Christendom. After centuries of cultural dominance, the churches are now back on the social margins, where they were in the early centuries. Our story, language, and practices are becoming unfamiliar. Despite exceptions, the church is declining in size and influence. Many Christians are discouraged and fearful for the future.

At the same time, this strange new world is offering fresh opportunities—for mission, church renewal, theological creativity, and counter-cultural discipleship. The Anabaptist tradition, which is familiar with the margins, may have much to offer. New expressions of church are emerging on the fringes of the institutional church. This course explores the emerg-

ing culture of post-Christendom, assesses the legacy of the Christendom era, faces the challenges of this new mission context, makes connections with the Anabaptist tradition, and asks how all this applies to the American context where an unofficial Christendom still persists.

History, Theology, and Ethics courses

August 5–12

Conflict, Communication, and Conciliation

CHM633 • 2 credit hours
Friday, 6:30–9:30; Saturday, 8:30–11:30 a.m., 1:45–4:30 p.m.; Monday–Friday, 8:30–11:30 a.m.

Situations of conflict in contemporary society and congregational settings are the focus of this course. Students will examine the fundamental theory and theology of conflict resolution and peacemaking and will become more familiar with basic approaches, conceptual tools, and models of working constructively at conflict in various settings, including in the congregation. Role plays will be used to introduce participants to skills and strategies useful in negotiation, informal mediation, and group decision-making. The course will draw upon family systems theory as a basis for understanding the dynamics of conflict and approaches to self-management.

May 31–June 10

Church Unity: A Theological History of the Ecumenical Movement

HTE611 • 2 credit hours
8:30–11:30 a.m.

The church has known unity and division since the time of the New Testament. This course traces the quest for unity at crucial points in church history, then concentrates on growth in oneness among Christians in the 20th century. The following questions will guide our study:

- Does unity matter?
- In what does the church's unity consist: doctrine, institutional structures, worship, lifestyle?
- What is "reconciled diversity"? Can schism be an act of faithfulness?
- What status should believers baptism and the peace position play in pursuing unity?

We will learn from such events as:

- the experiment of "unity in essentials, liberty in nonessentials and charity in all things"
- Orthodox-Baptist encounters in Eastern Europe
- Catholic-Mennonite dialogue

Personal Ethics

HTE645 • 2 credit hours
8:30–11:30 a.m.

In an individualistic and pluralistic culture, what traits ought we cultivate in nurturing authentic Christian moral character? How might such traits be encouraged? With a focus on the formation of moral character, selected issues will be considered, such as the ethics of lifestyle and use of money; work and leisure; health and medicine; death and dying; sexual conduct, singleness, marriage, and family; and response to acts of violation and violence. The role of the Christian congregation in relation to the personal ethics of its members also will be explored.

Church and Race

HTE649 • 2 credit hours
8:30–11:30 a.m.

This course will explore the modern concept of race as well as the destructive impact of racism today and in the history of the church. Participants will develop critical definitions for key constructs as they apply to race and racism and will identify creative forms of resistance to racism that are compatible with Christian nonviolence. The course will address the responsibilities of Christians, who both benefit from and suffer from systems of racism. Students will construct a biblical foundation for dismantling racism.

Internship

Congregationally Supervised Pastoral Education (CSPE)

This program provides opportunity for a supervised internship in a congregational setting. The congregation selected should have these characteristics: (1) a commitment to the concept of the ministry of the whole people of God; (2) the willingness to commit congregational resources to this training program; and (3) the necessary professional resources in the congregation to provide adequate educational supervision. In the context of such a congregation, the student will explore and develop the range of his or her ministering skills and gifts. The student is encouraged to internalize a sense of identity as a professional minister through observing other ministers as role models. At the same time, he or she will have the opportunity to participate in the life and work of a congregation in preparation for congregational ministry in other settings. The period of time normally will be an intensive three-month summer or an extended seven or eight months, with the option of an entire calendar year.

Cross Cultural Ministry Intensive
SCUPE M 302 • 3 credit hours
June 6–10, 13–17, 9:00 a.m.–5:00 p.m.

Using the city as a multicultural global laboratory, this two-week intensive develops practical theology for ministry in a multicultural context, engages biblical study of the early church's struggle with cultural barriers, encourages respect and appreciation of worldviews and value systems different from one's own, offers anti-racism training, builds skills in movement and communication across cultural divides, and exposes students directly to a wide variety of ministries in diverse cultural settings. MS I Nature and Practice of Ministry

Supervised Ministry Practicum

TBA, 3 hours

Focuses on personal formation for ministry by integrating work in the ministry setting with SCUPE's academic course load. Using a case study approach, it provides a forum for faith sharing, personal self-awareness of gifts and skills for ministry, theological reflection on experience, and peer group reflection on actual ministry in response to the Gospel. It is also the course vehicle for SCUPE's full-time summer internship field education/ministry credit.

Celtic Spirituality Pilgrimage

Join other pilgrims on a journey to ancient, medieval, and modern centers of Celtic spirituality in Scotland, Ireland, and England.

Registration and tuition

Most summer course offerings are for one or two credit hours. An additional credit hour in some courses may be earned via arrangements with the instructor for additional work and payment of tuition for the additional credit hour.

In any one session, a student may take only one course for credit.

Upper level college students may enroll in courses, with credit likely transferable to the students' college programs. Full-time students from Mennonite colleges, with their faculty advisers' approval and signature, may take one AMBS course for graduate credit at 25 percent of the fee. Credit taken at this reduced rate is not to be used to meet undergraduate degree requirements.
